

Blowing Up Fritz.

Sap. A. E. Hastwell, writing from France on June 8 to Mr. B. Lloyd, at Yorketown, says:—I have got transferred to another battalion. We have a very exciting time all the while, blowing up Fritz, and he doing the same to us. It is all right so long as one is not caught. There is much of chance in the game of war though, and we left Australia to fight, not to look on. A hundred of us were the first Australians in the trenches in France. We have very heavy bombardments at times. Gallipoli was a fool to it. It is very pretty at night time, but unpleasant to be in, especially when your own trenches are getting knocked about. I do not think that any of us will be sorry when we are on the home track again; but not before we have seen the Kaiser and his dupes well under. I am still one of the lucky ones, and hope my luck may continue. Won't we give those Minlacowie fish what-ho when I get back, which I do not think will be a great while now. This is a fine country. We had a three days' trip right through France, and so had a good look at the country. There is no waste of any kind.
